1. Read the title and create two guide questions. (Why? How?)	
2. Review the vocabulary words and highlight in the text.	
3. Review text and highlight any typographical cues (italics, bold, bulleted/numbered lists).	
4. Notice any graphs, tables, images, or pictures. Highlight and write summary note in margin.	
5. Review boldface headings and create one guide question per heading.	
6. Read the first paragraph and highlight key sentence/s. Put summative comment in the margin.	
7. Read the last paragraph and highlight key sentence/s. Put summative comment in the margin.	
8. Make two predictions about what you believe will be covered in the essay. Write them down so you can confirm or deny as you read actively.	
9. Complete a short freewrite (7-9 sentences) to connect the essay to your background knowledge and/or personal experience.

During Reading Tasks

Complete the following tasks as you read.

1.Decide on a highlighting system and implement it. (Ex.: one color for main ideas, another for details). Avoid over- or underhighlighting.	
2. As you read, determine if you need to look up unfamiliar vocabulary that you highlighted during prereading. (Only look up unfamiliar vocabulary that impedes your ability to understand the main ideas of the text.)	
3. As you read, answer all guide questions.	
4. Confirm or deny predictions with a check or "x."	
5. Annotate the text as you read. Be sure to have at least 2-3	
comments per page. Annotations should include the following:
